9. NOTICE OF MOTION

a) Mayor McCabe – Protection of Waterloo's Natural Heritage Areas and Green Space for consideration December 4, 2023

WHEREAS in November 2022, the Government of Ontario passed Bill 23, *More Homes Built Faster Act*, as part of Ontario's Housing Supply Action Plan with the goal of building 1.5 million new homes in Ontario by 2031, and

WHEREAS Bill 23 mandates that, upon legislative proclamation, all land use planning be transitioned from regional governments – the Region of Waterloo – to local municipalities such as the City of Waterloo, and

WHEREAS Waterloo City Council has and continues to value and take measures to conserve significant natural features and systems through adoption of environmental policies and municipal decision-making, and understands the importance of conserving significant green spaces in a natural state and to minimize disturbances to such spaces, and

WHEREAS Waterloo City Council's Official Plan, Strategic Plan and Economic Development Strategy outline a long term commitment to building a community that is vibrant, diverse and sustainable as the city continues to intensify and urbanize, and

WHEREAS Waterloo City Council acknowledges and understands the importance of rural communities and their contributions particularly with food security, preservation of sensitive natural heritage areas/systems and other green spaces, and economic development, and

WHEREAS Waterloo City Council understands and appreciates that the Countryside Line is a boundary that protects the cultural, economic, and environmental heritage of our neighbouring municipalities' rural lands from the pressures of urban sprawl and that the Countryside Line protects the integrity of rural communities from suburban expansion, and

WHEREAS the City of Waterloo has, for decades, actively planned to grow inward through a comprehensive growth management (intensification) strategy, and accordingly has sufficient land currently and until 2050 to accommodate the growing population within Waterloo's existing municipal boundaries, and

WHEREAS past and present Waterloo City Councils have been leaders in environmental protection and understand that it is our responsibility to protect our environment, and that sound urban planning helps protect the environment while enabling the city to grow,

THEREFORE be it resolved that Waterloo City Council reaffirm its longstanding practice of acquiring and protecting sensitive natural heritage areas/systems and green spaces from development, and managing growth in a sustainable manner.

A. Executive Summary

The Corporation of the City of Waterloo entered into a MSAA between Ontario Health and the Health Service Provider (HSP) effective April 1, 2019 and since then the Agreement has been extended on several occasions.

The City of Waterloo is required to complete the Declaration of Compliance and requires a resolution for the Mayor to sign.

The MSAA provides the Corporation of the City of Waterloo with funding to operate programs and services for seniors under the Community Programming and Outreach Services division. Services offered to seniors living in Waterloo include transportation to medical and non-medical appointments, homemaking, lawn care, snow removal and home maintenance, telephone reassurance, grocery shopping and a community dining program. In addition, the Senior Day Program provides therapeutic programming to seniors with disabilities, cognitive impairments or other chronic illnesses. These services allow seniors in our community to live independently at home longer, provide meaningful programming experiences and facilitate socialization and engagement amongst community members.

Multi-Sector Service Accountability Agreement - Declaration of Compliance - City of Waterloo Older Adult Programs COM2023-039

Background

The Corporation of the City of Waterloo provides Community Programs and Services for all ages, and one of these services is a provincial funded service for older adults who have health concerns. These services include:

Senior Outing Day Program

Community Meal Program (meal program for Day Program and any other eligible members of the community)

Transportation Program

Telephone Security

Home Maintenance (Snow Shoveling, Grass Cutting, minor repairs around the home)

Home Help (Helping Seniors with various aspects of care including washing, and cleaning of their homes.

All of these are through a referral process with LHIN Community Care Access.

The purpose of these programs and services is to assist seniors with special needs to maintain their independence and live in their homes as long as possible. In addition with supports such as these is a relief for Care Givers and intends to minimize those using hospitals and over utilization of the systems.

A portion of the funding for this program is provided by the Province of Ontario and the City of Waterloo is considered to be a HSP. Examples of other local HSP includes City of Kitchener, University of Waterloo, Woolwich Community Health, to name a few. In order to receive this annual funding, the City of Waterloo is required to have a MSAA.

The MSAA is a funding agreement that assigns a measure of responsibility to the HSP and sets out accountabilities and performance expectations. MSAA is a three year service accountability agreement between Province and the HSP. The MSAA enables these entities to provide funding to the HSP for the provision of services

The City of Waterloo is required to complete the Declaration of Compliance and requires a resolution for the Mayor to sign.

The City of Waterloo is an Age Friendly Community and therefore we have strong advocates who are promoting and identifying needs to reduce social isolation, increase social participation and advocating for the senior and vulnerable populations, and it is very important that the City of Waterloo is an active player in the provision of Health Service.
